We will make changes after we have heard what people think.




The National Education and Learning Priorities are for places of learning like:

The National Education and Learning Priorities say what will help learners the most.


Priorities are the most important things to do.

The draft National Education and Learning Priorities



Priority 1

- safe
- included

- their culture




what they need to help them learn.

listen to what family and whānau think.






Places of learning should remember that every learner can do well.




Every learner should get the chance to learn about all different subjects.

If there are **barriers** for learners then this needs to change.





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We need to make sure learners are supported when:

- they move to a new place of learning
- they leave a place of learning
- things change for them at their place of learning like going into a new class.






Learners should **not** be shut out of things that happen at their place of learning.



Learners should **not** be shut out because of not having enough money.



Places of learning should give jobs to **new teachers** as well as people who have been teaching for a long time.



Places of learning should support the people who work for them to keep:

- learning
- getting better at their jobs.



Te reo Māori should be heard every day in places of learning.

Te reo Māori is the Māori language.



Tikanga Māori should be part of how we do things in places of learning.

Tikanga Māori are Māori ways of doing things.



What they learn should help learners to understand:

- the different cultures of people who live in New Zealand
- the unique history of New Zealand.

Unique means different to what has happened anywhere else.



Places of learning should be connected to:

local communities

- local hapū
- local iwi.



Hapū are groups of families / whānau who are related to each other.



Iwi are bigger groups that include many hapū.



What local people want for their future should be important for places

of learning when they:

- set goals
- make plans.
